Introduction



General Academic Vocabulary:

- Words that occur frequently across different academic subjects are classed as general academic vocabulary.
- Many general English words are used slightly differently in academic texts (e.g. essays, reports, articles).
- In order to write accurately, students need good knowledge of general academic vocabulary.



OLDAE (1)



Oxford Learner's Dictionary of Academic English:

- Contains 22,000 words, phrases, and meanings
- Includes 50,000 examples from real academic texts
- Contains synonyms and collocations
- Includes an interactive writer (Oxford iWriter)

present simple I / you / we / they **analyse** BrE /'ænalɑɪz/ ; NAmE /'ænalɑɪz/ 

he / she / it **analyses** BrE /'ænalɑɪzɪz/ ; NAmE /'ænalɑɪzɪz/ 

past simple **analysed** BrE /'ænalɑɪzd/ ; NAmE /'ænalɑɪzd/ 

past participle **analysed** BrE /'ænalɑɪzd/ ; NAmE /'ænalɑɪzd/ 

-ing form **analysing** BrE /'ænalɑɪzɪŋ/ ; NAmE /'ænalɑɪzɪŋ/ 

This icon means ‘analyse’ is on the Academic Word List.



OLDAE: Sample Entry for “Analyse”

to examine the nature or structure of something, especially by separating it into its parts, in order to understand or explain it

- **analyse something** *Tomlinson (1999) analysed UK survey data, finding that...*
- *Some recent studies have analysed the impact of media on voter attitudes.*
- **analyse something for something** *A 50 cm³ sample of water was analysed for its calcium content.*
- **analyse how/what, etc...** *The authors analyse how dominant cultural values enter the classroom.*

+ Synonyms

+ Collocations

+ Word Family

The plus signs expand to show:
words with similar meaning [synonyms];
words that go together well [collocations];
different forms of words [word family].

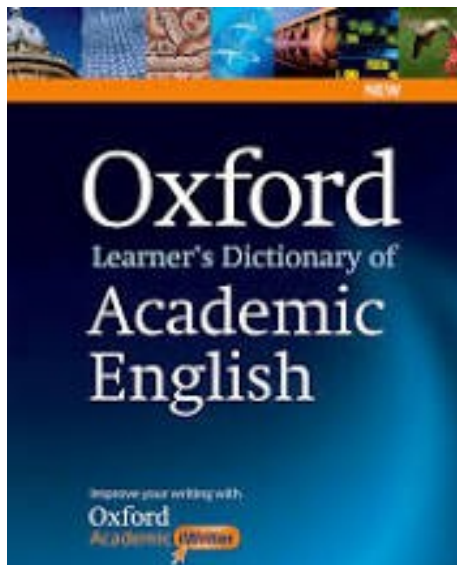

OLDAE has an academic writing tutor:

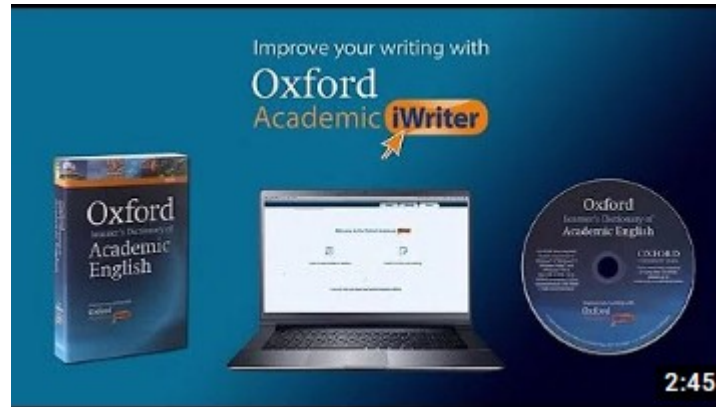
- The interactive writer (iWriter) includes samples of different types of text (e.g. essays, reports, dissertations).

The AWL (1)



The Academic World List (AWL):

- The AWL (Coxhead, 2000) lists English academic vocabulary.
- The list contains 570 word families.
- The AWL covers about 10% of vocabulary in written academic texts.
- The AWL is divided into 10 sub-lists.
- The most frequent words are on sub-list 1.

The ACL (1)



The Academic Collocation List (ACL):

- The ACL (Ackermann & Chen, 2013) lists pairs of words that often appear together in written academic texts.
- The list contains 2,469 words.
- There are 7 types of collocation [e.g. adjective + noun; verb + adverb].
- Word combinations of the ACL are drawn from the Pearson International Corpus of Academic English (PICAE).

OPAL (1)



The Oxford Phrasal Academic Lexicon (OPAL):

- The Oxford Dictionaries website has a link to OPAL: 4 lists of academic vocabulary from real academic examples.
- OPAL consists of 2 word lists (spoken and written) and 2 phrase lists (spoken and written).
- OPAL includes words and phrases across 4 areas; physical sciences, life sciences, social sciences, arts and humanities.
- Word entries that are on the lists will have an OPAL icon.



OPAL (2)



The Oxford Phrasal Academic Lexicon (OPAL):

- The word list (spoken) has 6 sub-lists.
- The word list (written) has 12 sub-lists.
- In the word lists, the most important words are on sub-list 1.
- The phrase lists are grouped into functions (e.g. classifying and comparing things, giving an example).
- The next slides show an example.

These symbols mean that ‘analyse’ is on the OPAL written and spoken word lists.

Glossary



<i>Collocation</i>	A term to describe words which are often seen together.
<i>Entry</i>	A piece of information (e.g. about a word) that is put into a record or a book, such as a dictionary (Adapted from OLDAE, p280).
<i>Function</i>	The purpose for which a piece of language or phrase is used.
<i>Sample</i>	An example of something (e.g. a dictionary entry) that can be looked at or tried out to see what it is like (Adapted from OLDAE, p.717).
<i>Synonym</i>	A word which has the same or a similar meaning to another word (e.g. advantage, benefit).
