Stress

- "Stress" refers to the way emphasis is given to
 - syllables in a word
 - syllables in words in a sentence
- Stress is related to rhythm in speaking
 - English is a "stress-timed" language. This means that the rhythm falls on stressed words in a sentence

de•<u>pend</u> (2) de•<u>pen</u>•dent (3) in•de•<u>pen</u>•dent (4) in•de•<u>pen</u>•dent•ly (5)

Word stress does not usually change

• It is a feature of the word itself

• This means that you can use a dictionary to check word stress

Say the sentences on the next slide aloud.

Which words sound more prominent? (i.e. louder, longer, stronger)

It depends

She's very dependent on him

I'm a very independent person

I can work independently

It depends

She's very dependent on him

I'm a very independent person

I can work independently

Notice that the stressed syllable in a sentence can change to convey meaning:

I said I'm very in•de•pen•dent not <u>de</u>•pen•dent

Read the nursery rhyme on the next slide. How many beats are there in each line?

A nursery rhyme is a simple poem for children

<u>Three blind mice</u> (3 beats) <u>Three blind mice</u> (3 beats) <u>See how they run</u> (3 beats) <u>See how they run</u> (3 beats) They <u>all</u> ran <u>after the farmer's wife</u> (4 beats) who <u>cut</u> off their <u>tails</u> with a <u>carving knife</u>! (4 beats) Did <u>ever you see</u> such a <u>sight</u> in your <u>life</u> (4 beats) as <u>three blind mice</u>! (3 beats)
